Agricultural Land Resources Protection

This course will introduce students to various measures introduced over the past several decades to better protect the agricultural land resources of the United States and to promote local food sources. Students will engage in a team research and analysis project consisting of a survey of agricultural land protection planning and implementation strategies in place in municipalities throughout New York. They will produce one or more reports on the status of planning for agriculture in the state and examples of successful implementation of agricultural land protection strategies.

As a field workshop the course will be organized around lectures, exercises and working as a member of an interdisciplinary team to produce a professional quality report or series of reports. A key goal of the semester is to expose students to the close interaction of planning, economic development and the social, economic and political forces in the development and implementation of land use planning in a rural and suburban context. The class will present its findings to the faculty and students at the end of the semester.

Course prerequisites: CRP 5520 or permission of the instructor.
